Yes, I know that “Interrogation” Sundays are a time-honored tradition that goes across the religious spectrum. Every religion and denomination falls back on letting the people ask the clergy questions.

It is usually a sure sign of late spring or early summer when the clergy have become as dry and parched as the land. It is an easy, no preparation, virtual day off (Okay, week off for those who really prepare sermons).

So, you ask (already the questions?) am I burned out and can't come up with any interesting topics? My answer is, “Not yet.”

I do these special Sundays about every five years. Over a long career I have seen the questions change and evolve. These Sundays are a good way to find out what is on your mind(s). From a time when most questions were social action and current events, the questions have seemed to evolve towards more spiritual concerns.

Was this a trend? Was it the natural result of getting tired of the crises of the month or did it come from a sense that things were going pretty decently in the world—at least for UUs? Surprise! I don't know.

Will your concerns start evolving back towards the political because most no longer see the world or the nation heading in the right direction? Will war and healthcare and politics reassert themselves? We'll see.

Write out a question. (Not a speech. That's my job.) We will collect the questions and I'll draw them at random and I will respond as briefly as I can. (I may invite the editor/publisher of the Observer, Sharon Kennedy, to edit me as I go. I sometimes run on (an occupational hazard).

While many of the questions cannot be answered fully in this context, your concerns will give me invaluable help in planning, over the summer, the issues with which I will wrestle in my future sermons.

President's Message

"Maintenance Required"

Coming back from PSWD District Assembly in Prescott at the end of April, the engine light on the dash board of my car came on and said "Maint Req" in yellow. I was in a hurry to get back for our Passover Seder that night and was more than a little stressed about having car problems out in the desert. I exited the highway and was lucky enough to find a mechanic, though rather off the beaten path. The light on my dash turned out to not be a big deal and all was well-- until a few more miles down the road, where an accident blocking the highway gave me plenty of time for "reflection and solitude". I remained calm and thought about one of my favorite subjects. UUCF! "Maintenance required" kept running through my mind and I began composing this article in my head. UUCF means the world to me--the people, the programs, "our" sanctuary, what we do for each other and the world outside our doors.

I promised myself that I would take a look at the goals set at the beginning of my presidency to see where we were and where else we needed/wanted to go. Here were the goals from the Aug. 04 newsletter:

- Continued depth, expansion and availability of programs—for children and adults
- Resolution of the administrative issues
- To have our committees continue to grow stronger and larger
- Reasonable growth
- More outreach to the larger community

We had three multi-generational programs this year--Blessing of the Animals, our Passover Seder and the Talent Show-- all VERY successful. Jon Dobrer has added a class on the 3rd Tuesday which so far has been very successful and has drawn lots of people. We've also had morning Adult RE classes throughout the year that were very popular.

Our administrative issues have a ways to go but generally have run smoothly with the administrative team we have. They do a wonderful job, and with the professionalizing of the bookkeeping there hopefully will be more done in this area over the coming year. Our committees have grown--some shifting of members and some changing of chairpersons--generally most are really functioning beautifully.

Reasonable growth is one of those funny things. The congregation numbers that we report to the PSWD and UUA have increased slightly, but there are many more friends and people that are just coming in the door and staying. I believe our social action projects, our terrific RE--both children's and adult, our wonderful circle dinners and social events are helping people connect. Many friendships have been formed and continue to do so through these groups.

Obviously we have great outreach through our social action--the work in the community has been great--from feeding the hungry, the CROP Walk, to Building Orange Country Together to our ties to the UUSC which serves the needy beyond our borders. We have recently joined FIMA (Fullerton Interfaith Ministerial Association) which works with the other faiths in the community on many service projects and interfaith activities. I see this as a big plus - a move toward becoming even more involved in the local community.

We need maintenance--intellectual stimulation, spiritual nourishment, inspirational food--daily, weekly, and on a regular basis. I believe we have this cuisine at UUCF. Our minister serves this up on Sunday mornings on a regular basis--his ministerial outreach to our congregants his kind, caring, professional and dedicated ministry to us has made such a difference in so many of our lives. We minister to one another through our Sunshine Committee, and as I've said before, we are all part of this committee. We do a spectacular job.

I have just completed my first year as president. YOU have been kind, wonderful, challenging, caring and supportive. Between the date that this is turned into the newsletter and this publication we have our congregational meeting. Assuming I am reelected, I will be your president for another year. Please speak with me about what maintenance is needed--what you like and what you'd like to see changed. Contact me to discuss OUR church. Help us continue to maintain this wonderful church with your support, participation and commitment. Our maintenance is always required and we have what it takes to keep our congregation growing, healthy, stable and vibrant.

March Board Meeting Summary

In attendance: Lou Arnwine, Carolyn Champagne, Jon Dobrer, Mike Mendelson, Mary Rhodes, Lorraine Rothman, Dennis Spiro, and Marlies Worley. Mike Mahaffey was present but left after presenting his report.

Announcements: Marlies Worley suggested that for the next board meeting in June that we have a special dinner before the meeting to welcome and say goodbye to new and exiting board members.

Minutes and treasurer's report approved with one minor change in minutes.

Unfinished Business: Calendar review completed and it looks like an exciting year coming up.

Action items: Marlies Worley signed the contract for deBenneville Pines weekend and then gave it to Frank Thomas to mail. Lorraine Rothman is to move church computer from her home to Jon's office here at Temple. (This has since been done.) Jon Dobrer will be discussing capital campaign with Judy Sterling and others. (We've had an interest in finding out details of this possibility so are investigating the details.)

Reports: Pledge drive update from Mike Mahaffey--Mike gave detailed report stating we were within 2% of goal. The board was happy to be this close to goal, gave the canvass committee a thanks--job very well done and a vote of confidence by counting on the 2% to be reached. (It was.)

Lorraine Rothman reported that 75 people attended the Seder, including 9 newcomers from Anaheim church. There was an excess of \$191.10 left over after everything was paid for. It was a great, warm and interesting event. Thanks to all who helped.

PSWD District meeting was attended by Dick Cole, Al Danzig, Randi Hetrick and Marlies Worley. Marlies reported there were informative workshops, business meetings and it was great to get together with people from other parts of the region.

FIMA (Fullerton Interfaith Ministerial Association): Marlies Worley is the new representative from UUCF to FIMA. A photo of her at the recent Day of Prayer event appeared in the OC Register on the front page. They stated that Christian, Jewish, Muslim and Unitarian groups were present. She plans to forward information she receives from this organization to the appropriate areas of church.

She will offer Jon Dobrer's participation in the FIMA Sept. 11th commemoration.

New Business: Role of Vice Pres. of board-- Marlies Worley suggested that it would helpful if the VP's role were increased to assist the president in mutually agreed upon areas to help distribute the work load a little more evenly. The board approved removing Robin Thornton as signer on accounts and placing Mike Mahaffey, Claude Coppel and Frank Thomas on our Charles Schwab and Fidelity accts. Jon Dobrer reported that Dick Cole, a deBenneville pines board member would like to begin a campaign to assist our camp financially. Jon stipulated that there be no blind-calling or mass mailing from our directory--rather to have Dick make direct contact with only people he knows. The board approved this effort and feels a brief presentation, information in the newsletter or at the social hall table would be appropriate. Dennis Spiro distributed a draft of a "Who We Are" flyer that had been developed by Juana Ventura and Doug Arvanites, to be available at the guest table. Some modifications were suggested and further review is planned.

REPORT FROM UUA

The UUA Board continued its exploration of "mission, vision, ministry and right relationship" on Thursday night with a group process designed to address "What is unique about the ministry that Unitarian Universalism offers the world? What is our unique mission? If UUism disappeared, what would be lost?" As you might expect, responses covered a wide spectrum: "We forge community around radical openness," "We accept the kernel of the divine in every person and honor the diversity of people's paths," "We are the nagging conscience of liberal religious faith." The board will continue to seek greater clarity and focus

about its own mission and role in advancing the vision and ministry of the Association.

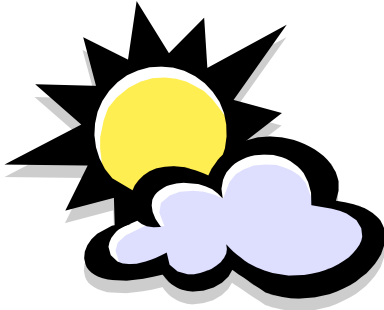
Growth continues to be a high priority for the Board, the Administration, the Districts and UUA member congregations. Adult membership among UU congregations grew 1.2 percent from 2004 to 2005. This compares favorably with the 4.9 percent loss of the Presbyterians, but not so favorably with the 11.1 percent growth of the Orthodox Church in America. President Bill Sinkford reminded us that the US population is growing faster than we are, and of even more concern, that our religious education enrollment has declined for three years in a row. What are we doing to foster healthy congregational growth?

As reported in January, the UUA's model for spurring growth involves metropolitan or regional strategies. Kansas City, site of the "Uncommon Denomination" marketing campaign of 2003, reported 20 percent growth in area congregations last year. Preliminary reports on visitors to Houston-area congregations suggest that their recent marketing and advertising campaign (on the theme "Imagine a religion") has been effective. The "I Believe" TV, radio and print campaign in San Diego will continue for another year and a half. We are learning from all of these initiatives.

At GA2005 in Ft. Worth, we'll get a complete update on the Pathways Congregation large church start, as well as updates on another large-church start in Devon, Pennsylvania. Four "breakthrough congregations," which have made significant gains in growth and vitality, will be featured in plenary sessions at GA2005. And "Presidents Roundtables" have been organized in eight metropolitan areas (including four in the PSWD) to spearhead growth initiatives in each of these areas. The Board and Administration are paying close attention to the demonstrated effectiveness of these initiatives as we try to determine "best practices for healthy congregational growth" within our movement.
