As I recuperate from my back surgery, I find myself deeply grateful for so many things. Utterly selfishly, I celebrate the progress medicine has made since my first back operation about twenty years ago. Instead of being filleted like a flounder, today they just drill two holes in the spine. (Hmm, this seemed better before I put it into such graphic terms) I felt better much faster than before.

I am also deeply appreciative of everything my wife Helene has done to comfort, support and help me heal. True, she too had some enlightened self-interest here. Listening to me cry and scream—as I did in the last 3 days before the surgery, could not have been fun. Her worry was palpable. On the bright side, she did learn that snoring wasn't nearly as bad as screaming. Small blessings. (Though she is still unsettled whether screaming is worse than my singing.)

And to you, my dear friends, I am extremely grateful for your support, understanding and patience. My spirits are buoyed by your cards, letters and emails. I feel the power of being held in your thoughts.

I am also very pleased at how well our congregation is functioning without my full participation. We have a strong community, one that my work enhances and supports but that I don't create. Our lay leadership, Marlies and our board, has made sure that we continue to function at a high level of both caring and competence. Judi and our

Mighty Choir continue to create moments of inspiration and beauty, and Doug Schneider has delivered faithfully and artfully my semi- remote sermons. (It has been great fun for me to write some controversial things and not have to be in the room to defend them!)

I know that I sometimes have joked that I wanted things to go OK on my days off but not so well that I wasn't missed. It is not true. I have wanted us to function wonderfully and strongly in my physical absence—and YOU have. We have gone on with stellar Sunday services, Religious Education and social events. You have cared for me, cared for each other and cared for the larger world. After collecting \$3,000 for Tsunami relief in just one special offering, you have contributed \$3,396 through our congregation for relief from Katrina. How much of your acts of kindness and generosity have been channeled through other organizations, I cannot calculate. But I will tell you how very proud I am to be a part of this amazing community.

I truly look forward to being back with you on October 2!

**Fullerton Interfaith**  
**Emergency Service (FIES)**

Living poor anywhere is difficult. Surviving on a minimum wage job in Orange County is almost impossible! There are many people here who do not expect public welfare, but attempt to raise families in situations that most of us would consider unbearable. Housing and food prices in Orange County are among the highest in the country.

FIES makes a huge difference in the lives of our working poor. It provides emergency housing and food for four months to working (or actively seeking work) families enabling them to save enough to be independent. That housing is called Neo Vista and is located on Amerige Street in Fullerton.

There is also a network of churches providing housing and food for working single homeless people for two week stretches at each church.

The third arm of FIES is the food distribution center in Fullerton, which a well-monitored emergency program providing help including motel vouchers for the unfortunate. Our church is the only church out of the 30 churches in FIES that collects every Sunday for this program.

Our church has just undertaken a new venture - the renovation of the meeting room at Neo Vista. Dan Guy and Tim Blaine met with Judi Bamba, the new FIES executive director. Our responsibility will be to provide whatever might be needed to make this room attractive and efficient. I think we can be very proud of our growing involvement with this excellent organization.

September was a difficult month for all of us. The images of all the destruction and devastation on the Gulf Coast and human suffering will be forever burned in my memory and that of many of us. This kind of pain, anguish and strife seems hard to understand and deal with, but deal with it we have deal with it we must.

When things are difficult, whether it is about my life or the lives of those around me, I do try to focus on the good things that do come out of the bad. We see people stepping forward everywhere to help and lend a helping hand to those who are suffering. This makes a difference in my life—the things that seem important and that comfort me and make my life easy are incredible blessings. I find it difficult to complain about my aches and pains—my door that doesn't quite close properly, my sink full of dirty dishes--the inconveniences of having to sit in traffic—all the things that make up every day life. The irritations of daily life that spark my anger and seem so important at the time they are happening seem pretty trivial. I believe it is a 12 step saying—“To have an attitude of gratitude.” I am grateful for all I have materially and more importantly the rich friendships with family and friends that I enjoy. When I'm feeling down and sorry for myself I make a gratitude list. A simple list that tells what I am grateful for because in times of pain, sorrow and anguish I tend to forget what is so good and sweet about this life. This helps me to refocus and find the needed balance. Embroidered at the top portion of the list is always UUCF.

This congregation is amazing and generous. At this writing we have contributed \$3396.00 to the Katrina Hurricane victims. Our UUSC (UU Service Committee) has been collecting money since right after the hurricane and I envision our association making a huge contribution both financially and with

the help of congregations/churches to assist this huge endeavor.

In the meantime back home at the farm...we have personally had an interesting time without our beloved minister Jon. I think we've held up and managed to get by without our minister's presence. We ARE a strong, talented congregation with many people in leadership positions that helped make everything come together. This is really heartening. Yes, we missed Jon terribly but we want him to heal properly, and return to us strong and well. We did have Jon's words at many of our services which was comforting and very helpful which added nourishment and wisdom to our services. I was amazed that he was able to write sermons and special messages to us while recovering from back surgery. His dedication to us is astonishing and we are so very lucky to have him as our minister. We welcome him back with open arms and gladness in our hearts.

I, personally, have even a stronger sense of my faith in this congregation and the wider UU world from this month of difficulty and tragedy. We are beautiful and work together in a beautiful way to help each other AND the world outside. It's part of our mission statement and part of my personal vision for this community that seems to be fulfilled on a regular basis. Let's hold our mission statement (and each other) close to our hearts and remember where we have been and where we are going.

Let us continue in our important work and the incredible support of one another and the larger world.

**Unfinished Business:** Calendar review done and all planned events look like they are set and proceeding well. Congregational meeting planned for Nov. 20 and we will be working on nominees for nominating committee. We have discussed a joint Thanksgiving celebration with the Temple and now will put announcement in order of service to see how much interest there is in doing this.

Capital Campaign--Jon will report on this more at next board meeting.

UUA proposed marketing plan for Orange County church has been something the board has agreed to go forward with. The date was to begin in January for 3 months, but I know that the UUA has been pretty wrapped up with the situation on the gulf coast so this process may be slowed a bit. We are waiting to hear more from them.

Pledge/Canvass campaign--we are working on chairperson for this important campaign which begins in the spring.

FIMA (Fullerton Interfaith Ministerial Association) meeting was attended by Marlies Worley and the 9/11 service at St. Jude went very well.

### **Liaisons reports:**

Service Auction--Donnette Gultinan will chair this again this year. Thank you, Donnette!!!  
Worship-All has been going well and Al Danzig has done excellent job with speakers and we have managed in Jon Dobrer's absence.  
Social Action- Rose Bale's home will be painted by congregants with Rose paying for the paint. Winter overnight housing for

homeless begins Nov. 1, UUCF will provide volunteers on Wed. nights. Previous years fund raising funds have been allocated to Neo Vista, Habitat for Humanity and Circulo de Amigas. UUSC--About \$2600 (NOW \$3396-- as of this writing) has been collected for the hurricane victims in the Gulf. Library--Aaron Stark has been compiling a list of lost or overdue books and will be working at the library on Sundays. Adult RE- will be resumed when Jon Dobrer returns. Social- planning has begun for the Holiday Dinner Dec. 10

**New Business:** Changes are underway for the method used to pay for custodial services for our Temple events on Saturdays. (6 per year)

## **Treasurer Corner**

I thought I would take this opportunity to clarify a few things. First, and most importantly, on behalf of the church I wish to thank each and everyone who contributes financially to the church. Without your hard earned dollars, we would not be able to continue the programs at UUCF.

I have been the church Co-Treasurer/Bookkeeper for several years now and during the last couple years I have received questions from time to time. As a result, I often wonder whether the questions I am being asked others might benefit by the answers as well. So on that basis I thought I would cover a few things in this month's treasurer article.

I am often asked: how or how often can I make my pledge contribution? I always inform congregants that the easiest way for you and for the church is simply to deposit your check contribution in the church offering that is passed through the isles each Sunday. As to how often, that is entirely up to each individual. We are happy to take weekly,

monthly, quarterly, or annual pledge contributions. Whatever works best for you and your budget! You are also welcome to mail your church contribution(s) directly to the church address. Sometimes people mail their checks directly to my home, which is fine as well. In other words there is no "wrong" way to contribute to the church. We welcome your contributions in any manor that works best for you!

If you would prefer to make a contribution to your pledge in the form of cash, simply put the cash in an envelope with your name written on the outside of the envelope and deposit it in the weekly church offering. Do not mail cash, as the money could get lost in the mail. If you don't happen to have an envelope with you on Sunday, simply deposit the cash in the church offering, and advise myself or Claude Coppel after the church service (or by email) and we will make sure that your cash contribution to UUCF is credited towards your pledge.

UUCF sends pledge statements each quarter to assist everyone and also provide a receipt for their tax records. Your pledge statement is not a bill. You are always free to increase and/or decrease your pledge with the church at any time, should your financial circumstances change. If you ever find yourself wanting to do so, simply let me know and I will be happy to honor your wishes. No questions asked, just let me know.
